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FACT SHEET: Good Friend, Inc.

Mission To create autism awareness, teach acceptance of differences, and foster empathy among typically-developing peers for students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

Method

- Inform those who teach, lead, or otherwise guide children between the ages of 4 and 12 — particularly if a child with ASD is amongst their group — about ASD in general and social relationships particularly. This is done through staff in-services and guest lectures. (*Middle school services to begin in 2011.*)
- Educate typically-developing peers using proprietary curriculum in a grade-specific manner about ASDs in general. In 30- to 60-minute peer sensitivity workshops, customize this education to fit the needs of their peer with an ASD. With parental consent, Good Friend agents learn about this child through the educators and caregivers before the workshop to maximize effectiveness.
- Through the interactive portion of the curriculum, foster empathy among typically-developing peers for their classmate or group member with an ASD. Get them to “feel” what it’s like to be this child. Teach them how they can be a good friend to this child.
- Provide general assemblies for organizations that choose not to focus on the empathy aspect of the awareness-acceptance-empathy model. Offer general information on ASD and friendship in such instances, and include cooperative exercises, without citing the special circumstances of individuals.
- Keep all interactions focused on the positive aspects of differences and the strengths of those with ASD.
- For all services, show the 16-minute video presentation, “How Can I Be a Good Friend to Someone with Autism?”
